#### Gentleman Steve Earned A Green Beret

FRIENDS and colleagues of Royal Naval Photographers' Association (RNPA) membership secretary Steve King, who knew him well, regarded him as a gentleman and also as a gentle man.

But as a young photographer he proved he was both tough and aggressive enough to successfully complete the brutal Royal Marines' Commando Course and qualify to wear the coveted green beret in preparation to joining 40 Commando as unit photographer.

Steve was one of the first Navy phots to complete the All Arms Course - its official title – at Lympstone in Devon, along with naval airmen 'Taff' James and Howard Balston, followed closely by RNPA member Mike Lay, who also took on the daunting challenge to earn a green beret.

Steve, who died aged 78 on December 1<sup>st</sup> 2022, was born in Isleworth, west London, and lived in Richmond, Surrey before moving to nearby Ham and then Whitton, attending several different schools before taking his GCEs at Whitton Comprehensive School.

A career as an architect beckoned but a seven-year apprenticeship didn't appeal, so Steve decided instead to join the Royal Navy - for nine years! He started his basic training at HMS Raleigh in October 1961 and completed his airmanship course at RNAS Culdrose in early 1962. Selected to train as a photographer, he was posted to HMS Daedalus at Lee-on-Solent to await course.

However, the course was not scheduled to start until June so he was sent north to RNAS Lossiemouth in Morayshire where a new phot section had been recently opened together with an impressive purpose-built property of Photography.

Steve did odd jobs around the section and assisted PO 'Mac' MaCarthy in the stores while

CPO Stan Mush' Fairhurst, PO Tony Spring and PO George Ash kept an eye on him and boosted his knowledge of the branch. He also used his time in the far north to pass his driving test.

In June he returned to HMS Daedalus to join No 1 Phot Q Course comprising naval airman Keith Rushby, Tom Stott, with whom he became firm friends, and four Army personnel. He and Tom then completed a three month training period, first at Lossiemouth and then at the Fleet Photographic Unit at Fraser Gunnery Range in Portsmouth to qualify as Phot 11s.

In September Steve and Tom were both drafted to HMS Centaur which was in dry dock at Portsmouth, and their first task onboard was to repaint the section. The photographic team under phot officer Steve Lock included CPO Mike Thorne, PO 'Mac' MaCarthy, leading airman Paul Yockney, and naval airman AJ Smith. Leading airman Jack Straw turned up later as squadron phot of 892 squadron (Sea Vixens).

After extensive sea trials the ship was commissioned by HM Queen Elizabeth 11 and sailed on December 21<sup>st</sup> for a 12-month tour of the far east. (Steve's account of the commission appears in the RNPA Newsletter: editions 19 and 20.)

On returning to the UK in October 1965, Steve was drafted to HMS Heron at Yeovilton, and then back to Lossiemouth for his Phot 1s Course where he was reunited with his friend and shipmate Tom Stott. Others on the course included Mike Gilbert, Ray Pogson, Jim Hendry and five Army photographers under instructor CPO Norman 'Chippy' Smith. On completion Steve was sent to HMS Goldcrest at Brawdy in west Wales.

A few months later he volunteered for attachment to the Royal Marines, and started a physical fitness programme by running round the camp as the reality of tackling the fearsome Commando Course hit home. (Mike Lay describes the sheer physical challenges of The All Arms Course at the end of this article.) Steve's tenacity shone through and he was awarded his green beret after successfully completing the course at the RM Lympstone Training Centre in Devon. At the same time he was promoted to leading airman. Posted to 40 Commando at Dieppe Barracks in Singapore in June 1969, he photographed a number of inter-services' exercises in Malaya, Australia and covering the UK's withdrawal from Aden whilst operating from the commando carriers HMS Bulwark and HMS Albion.

On completing his detachment with the Royal Marines in February 1969 he joined the Fleet Photographic Unit at Fraser Gunnery Range in Portsmouth as a petty officer, and it was whilst working there that he first met WRNS photographer Hilary (Cramphorn) who was, many years later, to become his wife.

GIBEX took him to HMS Rooke in Gibraltar from February to April 1969 to photograph this major naval exercise, and the following year he was drafted to DPRN at the Old Admiralty Buildings in Whitehall, London for a Public Relations photographic course before being posted to HMS Tamar in Hong Kong as a PR phot, working out of Victoria Barracks.

This plum 18-month draft enabled him to travel to Seoul in Korea, where units from Hong Kong were carrying out sentry duties at the American base, thereby allowing Steve to visit Panmunjom on the demilitarised border with North Korea. Other photographic jobs took him to New Zealand where the Irish Guards were carrying out exercises, and to Auckland where their band performed in a military tattoo.

Steve returned to the UK in October 1972, and in February 1973 he left the Navy from Victory Barracks, Portsmouth.

After a three-month leave period he got a temporary job as a photographer with Swingshots, an operation that visited golf courses and used a multi-shot Polaroid camera, video and a Newman Sinclair cine camera to capture and analyse a golfer's swing.

At the same time an interview at the Government Communication's Bureau in London landed him a job as a darkroom technician. Steve accepted the job offer, later being promoted to chief photographer then chief printer in the Reprographic Department, spending a total of 29 years with the Bureau before retiring in 2003.

Thirty years after first meeting, Hilary and Steve met again at the 1999 Annual RNPA Reunion being held in Victory Barracks, Portsmouth. Letters were exchanged afterwards, their friendship blossomed and they were married in Leamington Spa Registry Office in 2001.

Steve collapsed and died suddenly on December 1<sup>st</sup> 2022 and his funeral, attended by a large number of family, friends and RNPA members, took place at Oakley Wood Crematorium near his home in Bishop's Tachbrook, Leamington Spa on January 30<sup>th</sup>. Ex-Navy phot Chris Dalby gave the eulogy high-lighting Steve's time in the Navy.

A live webcast of the funeral was made available to RNPA members, and a lively wake followed at the Leopard public house in the village.

## Tough Going For Phot 'Commandos'

"From the mid-1960s any Royal Navy photographer drafted to a Royal Marine unit had to complete the Commando Course – officially known as The All Arms Course.

The Marines gave no concessions whatsoever to less than fit Naval photographers.

On arrival at the Royal Marines Training Centre at Lympstone in Devon they joined a course of RM recruits who had already completed 12 to 20 weeks of basic training, and who were fit and enthusiastic.

Once kit was issued, training commenced the next day. Every day started with battle PT consisting of fireman's lift runs carrying your opposite number, Tarzan bars, wire and high wall crawls. The next 12 weeks included sessions of unarmed combat, live weapon firing - everything from pistols to anti-tank weapons. Route marches, beginning with a three-miler and building up to nine miles, were part of the daily routine. The runs were all taken at the double while carrying your personal SLR rifle and full ammunition pouches.

Failure was not an option. Phots who were very fit found it gruelling. For those not so fit, it could be hell!

Saturday mornings meant the Endurance Run, a run up to Woodbury Common, followed by a series of mud gullies, rough ground and tunnels half-filled with water which had to be negotiated before doubling back to Lympstone and completing a leopard crawl over a tank of water and then firing your SLR.

No shore leave was granted until every item of kit and equipment had been thoroughly cleaned.

Towards the end of the course Amphibious Training was undertaken at Poole in Dorset.

Finally came the dreaded 30-miler over the moor, carrying your SLR and full pouches, which had to be completed in just eight hours.

Only on completion was a green beret presented and worn. The torture was over..."

## Farewell to Shipmates - Bob Lomax



## High Flying Bob Took On Bobsleigh Run

Born in St Mary's Hospital in Manchester on 21 April 1931 and named Robert Ian Lomax - the first born son of Alice and Robert Lomax. Bob grew up in a council house in Wythenshawe with his two younger brothers, David and Keith.Bob joined the Navy in October 1948 at 17 years of age - he started his naval airmanship training as he really wanted to learn to fly but an issue with his ears at a medical ruled him out.

He instead commenced training as a naval photographer in February 1949 - the start of his long career in photography and film. Bob served on a number of different ships and spent time working as a Photographic Officer in Culdrose, Cornwall.

Bob served in Londonderry in 1954, which is where he met his future wife, Betty Sweet, who was in the WRNS. A case of mistaken identity at a dance - Bob was rather drunk and mistook Betty for someone else - but thank goodness as they went on to spend a very happy 60 years together until Betty passed away in December 2014. Bob spent the final two years of his naval service based in the Fleet Photographic Unit at Hal Far in Malta. There he served as Admiral Mountbatten's photographer, covering all his trips and activities around the Mediterranean. Bob described this as the best job he ever had in the service.

Bob was demobbed in April 1956 and settled in Bristol. He married Betty, by then a policewoman, in October 1956. Bob and Betty went on to have two children - Sarah in April 1962 and Simon in March 1964 and bought family homes firstly in Winterbourne and later in Yatton, between Bristol and Weston-super-Mare.

Bob joined Bristol Siddeley Engines, a British aero engine manufacturer, in the late 1950's. Based in Filton, they produced military aero plane engines including the Orpheus turbojet for the Folland Gnat light fighter/trainer aircraft used by the Red Arrows. While Gnat formation aerobatics were strictly forbidden, when Bob went to photograph the new Gnat simulator in September 1963, four of the pilots decided he should take photographs of the real Gnats flying in formation. On 10th September, two sorties were flown with Bob on board. The next day they flew their first formation aerobatic sequences with Bob in the 'camera-ship'. Afterwards, a note and Bob's photographs were left on the Chief Instructor's desk and were credited with helping to launch thousands of subsequent aerobatics displays.

By 1960, Bob was working for W D & H O Wills in Bristol as their Director of Photography. One of their brands, Embassy Cigarettes, sponsored a wide range of sporting events. As well as making promotional films for the company, Bob travelled extensively to photograph and make films about sailing, fishing, sky-diving, gliding, show-jumping, golf, rallying, powerboat-racing,water-skiing, canoeing and bob sleighing. He was even taken down the Cortina bob sleigh track in Italy. The company also sponsored a motor-racing team, Embassy Racing, founded by Graham Hill in 1973 and so Bob filmed for them until everything was cut short by the death of Graham Hill and some of the team's top personnel when Hill's light aircraft crashed in thick fog in November 1975 returning from France to London.

Bob finished his career in the far less glamorous world of cement and concrete, leading a team promoting it at the British Cement & Concrete Association in Wexham Springs, Buckinghamshire. In 1993, at the age of 62, Bob was made redundant from the BCA and so he and Betty decided to commence their retirement a few years early and to fulfil their dream of moving to the West Country and living by the sea in Devon. Bob and Betty were very happy in Dawlish for fifteen years where Bob finally realised his long-held ambition to own a small boat. In June 2008, Bob and Betty moved to their final home in Colden Common, near Winchester. Bob missed being by the sea but Betty and he made frequent day trips to the Hampshire and Dorset coasts as well as many visits to family and friends across the country. In June 2008, Bob and Betty moved to their final home in Colden Common, near Winchester.

After Betty passed away in December 2014, life was never the same or as happy for Bob. Despite suffering ill health since the age of 70, he lived independently for the first few years and was proud to be able to cook, clean and iron for himself - the latter a skill he'd acquired in the Navy as their uniform bell bottoms required seven creases for the seven seas. Bob eventually had a team of carers, including his daughter, to look after his home but insisted the only personal care they should provide was with his hated pressure socks which were a struggle to put on. He was determined to live as independently as possible and in his own home until the end: something he achieved with his two beloved cats - firstly Derry, named after Londonderry where he'd met Betty, and secondly a stray he called Gerry.

Bob passed away in the Royal Hampshire County Hospital in Winchester on 11 November 2022. Having been admitted four weeks earlier with an infection, he contracted Covid and then pneumonia whilst in hospital which eventually defeated him.

During my time with 42 Cdo I served in Canada, Norway and Northern Ireland. The latter was a really rewarding time as I was called upon to master a number of photographic skills new to me and then train the Booties to undertake surveillance both in the day and night.

Another highlight of my Phot career was to be involved in the Nickleby Operations, initially in setting up darkrooms with machine printing abilities on various ships, then as a flying phot.

There are many good dits from these times including the time the skipper rang the darkroom to ask if it was okay to carry out ship's manoeuvres. Good to see he recognised the importance of our role.


